



### BORED SUMMER KIDS

It must be summer again. It's easy to tell that some of the kids in town are out of school and have nothing to do, because our criminal mischief crimes have gone through the roof. At least I hope that kids are responsible, as some of our recent cases are so senseless that I can't imagine a mature mind thinking them up! To be very honest, boredom, a lack of respect for others and I dare say it, stupidity is the only possibility for what is going on.

Criminal Mischief is actually a pretty innocent-sounding name for a crime that can be very serious... and costly, to you as a parent and citizen. It almost sounds cute. In reality it's anything but. Hundreds of thousands of dollars a year in damage is done in our community when otherwise good kids get bored or have no parental guidance, oversight or supervision. Yes, I believe (and so do the courts) that you as parents are responsible... at least to some degree, for the actions of your offspring.

Too often kids are turned loose to run our streets with no rules. They are given every freedom and it seems that in some homes are taught that they have more rights than other people and do not have to respect any boundaries regarding their behavior. When one of our Officers picks these kids up at 2:00 am the parents get mad at us--just for trying to enforce the laws that all of you approved! These laws are designed to protect you, your property and even the darling kids who are breaking them.

You are probably wondering, "why the rant?" It's because on Saturday night, June 9, 2007, someone's child, or children, decided to drive all over Pleasant Grove, Lindon and Orem shooting out car windows. Again, this sounds like innocent fun doesn't it? After all, it's just a BB or pellet gun, they really can't hurt anyone. We'll see if this thought hurts.

What these kids did was to cause approximately \$30,000 in immediate damage, untold thousands of dollars cost in time and inconvenience for all of the vehicle owners, and future thousands of dollars in cost to all of us through rising homeowners and car insurance rates. In addition, you have to pay for the investigative time and cost for our department to try and track them down and make them answer for it. The cost for the courts to baby-sit them, as they get probation or whatever punishment through the system, as well as maybe even the cost of their future crimes when they still don't learn their lesson.

As good people living together in a wonderful community, we can't allow this to happen. We shouldn't have to. Kids will do dumb things, Heaven knows... so also will adults. But together, we have to try and stop it. Someone out there knows who these kids were; they've bragged to their friends about it, their parents know that they've been out late at night, they know that they have a BB or pellet gun, their neighbors may have information or someone may have seen them. We believe that a suspect vehicle may have been a white Jeep Cherokee, lifted with bigger tires. As Author Barry Farber said, "Crime expands according to our willingness to put up with it." I believe that we don't wish to put up with it any longer.

Parents please know what your kids are doing. Supervise, as best you can, their activities. Above all, teach them respect for others. Doing so will benefit us all in the future. For the present, we need to solve the recent crimes and to make the victims of those crimes whole again. Pleasant Grove is teeming with economic potential right now, and the City Council and Senior Staff are actively engaged in a multi-year, multi-million dollar economic expansion for the city. In further Business Alliance news, Richard Bradford, Director of Economic Development for Pleasant Grove, recently explained that there is an emerging market for electronic companies in The Grove area of the city. The area is ideal for the location of these businesses due to several factors. There is a short, 10-minute commute time for 303,000 people in the area, as well as a population of 17,000 technology employees. He also added that the average income in the area is \$70,000.

The location of The Grove is right on Utah’s newest freeway ramp. 640 acres are available; with 160 already sold. The area is surrounded by Class A office park designation, with the cost per square foot currently \$10 to \$20.

### CERT INFORMATION

The Pleasant Grove/Lindon Department of Public Safety will be sponsoring a C.E.R.T. (Community Emergency Response Team) training program for 2007. The Spring 2007 CERT session will begin on Wednesday July 11, 2007 6:00 to 10:00 p.m; Thursday, July 12, 6:00 - 10:00 p.m; Friday July 13, 6:00 - 10:00 p.m and Saturday July 14, 9:00 a.m - 1:00 p.m. Classes will be held at the Pleasant Grove Public Safety Building, 87 East 100 South, Pleasant Grove,, UT. The following topics will be taught over the three day training sessions: Disaster Preparedness; Disaster Fire Suppression; Disaster Medical Operations Part I; Disaster Medical Operations Part II; Light Search & Rescue; Disaster Psychology and Team Organization and Disaster Training Exercise.

You will be required to attend all four scheduled classes and complete all seven modules to complete the C.E.R.T certification.

The C.E.R.T. program is two-fold. It is designed to prepare for and to respond to the needs of you, your family and your neighbors in a catastrophic disaster situation. and will also act as an extension of emergency services in such an event.

Please pick up an application for the next CERT class at the police department. Please fill it out and return it along with the \$35.00 registration fee before July 3, 2007 to the Pleasant Grove Department of Public Safety. (Make checks payable to Pleasant Grove Police Department). The registration fee will include the costs for safety equipment and training materials. You will receive a CERT student manual upon receipt of your \$35.00 payment and completed application. ### EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT--

Pleasant Grove City will hold a non-partisan, Municipal General Election on November 6, 2007 to elect three Council members to serve four-year terms of office. If more than twice the number to be elected file for candidacy, a Municipal Primary Election will be held on September 11, 2007.

To qualify for candidacy, a person must be a United States citizen at time of filing; be a registered voter of the municipality, be a resident of the municipality or a resident of a recently-annexed area for a period of 365 consecutive days immediately preceding the date of election, and not be a convicted felon.

Each person seeking to become a candidate shall file a Declaration of Candidacy in person with the City Recorder, or have a Nominating Petition filed in his or her behalf during office hours, beginning 8 a.m. Monday, July 2, 2007 thru 5 p.m. on Monday, July 16, 2007. (NOTE: The office will be closed on July 4th). Filing documents will be available in the City Recorder's office, 70 S. 100 E., Pleasant Grove, UT, weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. For further information, please contact the City Recorder's office, (801) 785-5045. A non-refundable filing fee of \$35 must be paid at the time of filing the declaration.

## GREETINGS FROM YOUR FIRE CHIEF

Finally! I had a free weekend, so I piled the boys and my sweetheart into the travel wagon and hitched up the 'ol sheepherder's trailer (That's what my wife sees when she looks at the old RV, but I think - "it's clean, it doesn't leak, it has a lock on the door, and it's paid for - that's serendipitous.) and hit the road for the hills. We drove up to what is affectionately called, "The Pasture," and circled the wagons, literally. My wife's gregarious family was our company at this encampment. It is nice to be outside of cell service and in a beautiful and relaxing setting - one not even my boys can readily destroy.

One night, after the sun had set and the firmament had become pressurized and compacted with the twinkle of lights from distances far beyond my thoughts, we all pulled up a chair and lit a camp fire. As the more garrulous family members continued their stream of yarns, spun on myriad subjects with questionable veracity, I have to admit, my focus changed by some unconscious effort, (certainly not a purposeful effort) and the weighty subjects at hand, and even the sounds of their voices, were pushed back into a subconscious silence. As I sat there in my self-imposed silence, basking in the warmth of the permeating radiant heat from the fire, the hypnotizing effect of the dancing flames actually brought me to a consciousness that has, in reality, been a constant companion since taking this job. The responsibility of ensuring the safety of a community can be burdensome. But the drayage of that burden is made lighter by an excellent staff and dedicated and competent line of emergency responders. But the fact of the matter is - we are just repairman (and women). By the time you call for help - it is after the fact. Our job is to come and try to fix what is wrong after it happened. We are glad to serve, and proud you would trust us enough to call us, but in many cases, prevention could save us all a ton of trouble.

Sitting around the camp fire, watching its shape-shifting antics, there was, all of the sudden, a pop. Adding to the already present litany of sparks, a fireworks like show temporarily filled the air and was carried up and away, skyward, on the convective currents. This show was courtesy of a simple physical change of a liquid to a gas. As the liquid reached its boiling point, it experienced a physical change, it turned into a gas. Along with this change, came an expansion of gases that produced a very small explosion within the embers of the fire wood. Thus, our miniature fireworks display. It was all very benign and hardly anyone noticed. But I did, and it brought something to mind.

With the celebration of the birth of this great Country, come fireworks. Every year we respond to numerous incidents that are a direct result of fireworks. Are fireworks dangerous? Yes! At the very least, they burn. At the worst, they fly and explode. It all scares me to death. I love the thrill of them, but they scare me.

This year, let's be safe with them. An adult should supervise the use of all fireworks. **DO NOT USE ILLEGAL FIREWORKS!** They are illegal because they are dangerous. The thrill and fun of dangerous fireworks is not worth the loss of an eye or hand. It is also not worth the loss of the beautiful foliage and greenery on our mountains. All fireworks sold in our area are legal. If you buy fireworks from another state, chances are you have illegal fireworks. It is a Class B misdemeanor to possess illegal fireworks - that's a possible \$1000 fine and 6 months in jail.

Let's have a great time celebrating our freedoms this July, but let's do it safely.

### *Yard Tip:*

Cut your lawns higher during the summer. 3 1/2 inches is best to keep the roots protected by the heat. Adjust your lawn watering times. It needs less water during the early summer than in August. Contact Slow the Flow (851-8467) for a FREE water audit to determine water needs for your sprinkler system, pressure output, and soil type. Be sure to mulch around your plants to help conserve moisture and control weeds.
